THE HAFU MANIFESTO

Hafu people have the right to choose which culture and citizenship they want to embrace.

There shall be no discrimination towards persons of mixed Japanese ancestry based on race, religion, language, gender or national origin.

There shall be no discrimination against any person of mixed Japanese ancestry who decide to embrace the Japanese ways of life.

All schools and cultural institutions in Japan shall accept all children regardless of ancestry for admision into classes in an integrated, non-demeaning and accepting environment.

There shall be no discrimination of people in employment, including compensation and benefits, based on race, ancestry or color.

All people of mixed race shall be free to participate in cultural, social and institutional events in Japan with equal and unqualified freedom of expression.

Non-native Japanese parents shall the the unequivocal right to raise their Hafu children in Japan.

There shll be no barriers to service and entry to Japanese businesses for Hafu people. Hafu people of Japanese descentshall be allowed citizenship in Japan upon birth, allowing full rights as Japanese citizens.

All Hafu citizens shall be entitled to the tenets of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, of which Japan is a signatory.
